One Down and One to Go

Halfway through my term as President signals a review of the past year and the highlight must be the very successful move of the Society's offices from Potters Bar to Abbey Court in Bedford. The General Manager, in last month's *RadCom*, covered this topic in more detail, including a mention of Bletchley Park. Since writing that piece the Society has been given the planning green light to demolish the existing wooden building currently behind Block B and to redevelop the existing site. More news of this will be published as the redevelopment moves ahead.

A new promotional aid in the form of GB4FUN MK2 appeared, initially at the HFC at Wyboston Lakes and then at the Leicester Show at Donington after the exterior graphics had been completed. Judging by the reactions of those who have seen the trailer to date, it is going to be busy in the forthcoming year visiting educational establishments and other venues.

The QSL bureau operation was also put out to tender and is now operated on behalf of the Society by Norcomm Services. A few problems manifested themselves during the changeover but these have been addressed and indications are that the system is now operating smoothly.

As I write this, I have just returned from the triennial IARU Region 1 Conference in Croatia where many of the papers were written by RSGB Spectrum Managers and specialist officers. More appears on this subject elsewhere in *RadCom* but one of the difficult subjects on the agenda was 40 metre bandplanning after 29 March 2009. This date was agreed at WRC-03 as the date on which the 7100 – 7200kHz segment would become an amateur service Primary allocation and coincides with the start of the broadcasting services A09 summer

schedules. The new bandplan, agreed after many hours of discussion, will appear in next month's *RadCom* and users of 40 metres are urged to study this carefully.

And what of the next 12 months? The development of Bletchley Park remains a priority. The fight continues against home networking devices that radiate up to 500 metres from installations, as does the uphill struggle against the importation of non-complaint computer PSUs. Negotiations continue with Ofcom and the Ministry of Defence on spectrum requirements for the future.

Finally, I must give thanks to all those volunteers who give their time and efforts into supporting the Society and its aims. Without you, the Society could not operate. On behalf of the Board and the National Council, thank you.

Exam News

Good news on the examination front – 2008 has seen a 6.8% percent increase in the numbers of candidates sitting all three levels of the RCE. This rise is across all three exams with the biggest increase in the numbers sitting the Advanced examination. The December 2008 Advanced examination saw 112 candidates participate. This is the largest number since the new examination structure was introduced.

All those involved at every level of the RCE scheme should be congratulated on this magnificent achievement particularly the clubs right across the UK who has in recent years embraced the training ethos. And the good news is the predicted figures for 2009 show a further percentage increase in candidates.

Trophy Manager

The Society is looking for a volunteer Trophy Manager to work with Jane Finch at Abbey Court, Bedford. The position involves the co-ordination of trophies on behalf of the Board, the Contest Committee and other groups within the Society with trophy responsibilities. Ideally, the person concerned will live within easy travel of Abbey Court in order to be able to help prepare trophies for presentation at events such as the AGM and the HF Convention. Morse Certificate

In 2009, the RSGB is to introduce a Morse Certificate of Competency to provide a form of recognition for those who wish to have something to record their achievement in learning Morse code. It is not intended that it should be a national standard of proficiency similar to the licence examinations.

The lowest speed for which the Certificate will be issued is 5 wpm. This has been chosen as the threshold to encourage learning the Code and as a step towards inspiring and achieving confidence and moving forward to higher speeds. Full details will appear in the February *RadCom*.

G5RP Trophy



The G5RP Trophy was donated by the Vale of White Horse ARS to commemorate its late chairman, Ted Wake. Although Ted's personal passion was HF DX, most of the society's membership were dedicated VHF DXers whom he often declared 'quite incorrigible' – but that standing joke did not disguise the unwavering support and leadership that he gave to the club and its members. When Ted died, those 'incorrigibles' decided to donate a trophy to achieve what he had always wanted: to encourage more newcomers into the higher levels of HF DXing.

The G5RP Trophy is awarded to a fresh newcomer each year. The terms of the award – for the most 'progress achieved' in the preceding year – are specifically designed to identify people who have recently boosted themselves into the higher levels of serious HF DXing. This can happen at any time in an amateur's radio career, so the G5RP Trophy is not limited to the newly licensed. On the other hand, 'progress' can be achieved in many different ways, which the judging panel can assess by individual merit.

The award is made each year by nomination, and is normally presented at the HF Convention. There are no rules about nominations being either open or secret, but if the winner is already attending the HF Convention it may come as a complete surprise – as it did to the 2008 recipient Tim Beaumont, MOURX.

The G5RP Trophy is achieving its purpose, for many past winners have gone on to become established and respected HF DXers. In the judges' experience there is never a shortage of suitable candidates, but there can sometimes be a shortage of nominations. So if you are an established HF DXer, and you know someone who deserves recognition and encouragement, then next year please do what Ted Wake would have wanted, and respond to the call for nominations (usually in the August *RadCom*).

IARU Region 1 Conference

A summary of conference matters and how they affect UK amateurs

REPRESENTATIVES. The 21st IARU Region 1 conference opened in Cavtat, Croatia on Sunday 16 November. Representing the RSGB at Cavtat was head of delegation Angus Annan, MM1CCR; RSGB General Manager, Peter Kirby, G0TWW; RSGB HF Manager, John Gould, G3WKL; RSGB VHF Manager, David Butler, G4ASR and RSGB Microwave Manager, Murray Niman, G6JYB. Graham G3VZV was there in his wider role of IARU-R1 Satellite Coordinator.

RSGB members also at the conference but wearing IARU hats were RSGB President Colin Thomas, G3PSM, IARU Region 1 HF Manager and Bob Whelan, G3PJT, who is the chairman of IARU Region 1 Regulatory and Licensing Working Group.

The conference secretary was Don Beattie, G3BJ. Staffing the conference office were Don Field, G3XTT, Ian Greenshields, G4FSU and Hilary Clayton-Smith, G4JKS. Ian Greenshields and Don Field also carried out the duties of Secretary of HF to microwave conference streams C4 and C5.

CAVTAT. The conference was officially opened by Kreso Antonovic from the Croatian Ministry of Sea Transport and Infrastructure. He welcomed the 140 delegates representing 51 Region 1 societies. He spoke of the development of radio communications in Croatia including the introduction of the new Croatian Communications Act this year. Following on, the Mayor of Cavtat, Madame Mira Buconic, offered the delegates a warm welcome to the nicest part of Croatia and hoped that the conference would be a great success.

On completion of the opening ceremony Ole Garpestad, LA2RR, the President of Region 1, chaired the First Plenary session. This session was primarily to agree the chairmen of the four conference streams: C2 – Credentials and Finance, C3 – Administration, C4 – HF matters and C5 – VHF/Microwave Matters. RSGB President Colin Thomas, G3PSM was nominated to chair the C4 committee.

During the afternoon session, the various Region 1 working groups met. These included the EMC WG, IARUMS WG, the EUROCOM WG and the ARDF working group.

Monday saw the start of work of the C2 Finance/C3 Administration streams and the C4 HF and C5 VHF/Microwave streams.

C2/C3 ADMINISTRATION. This area of the Conference was attended by the head of the RSGB delegation Angus Annan, MM1CCR and RSGB General Manager Peter Kirby, G0TWW.

During the course of the discussions, the conference agreed minor changes to the HST (High Speed Telegraphy) and ARDF (Amateur Radio Direction Finding) rules, to allow both disciplines to expand.

Wolfgang Hadel, DK2OM, Chairman of the IARU Region 1 Monitoring Service, reported that there were now fifteen countries working in the Monitoring Service. He also informed the conference that the Monitoring Service will be monitoring the migration of the broadcast stations from 7100 – 7200MHz, which is due to commence from 29 March 2009.

The conference recognised the importance of the EUROCOM group

establishing greater influence by, and visibility of, the amateur services within the European Commission and the EU. EUROCOM was invited to develop a strategy to achieve these objectives. The conference agreed to revise and delete a number of standing recommendations. The most contentious of these was recommendation 1.16.5.2 that was introduced at the Brighton conference in 1981. This recommendation, when introduced, discouraged mixed amateur radio and CB radio events and recommended that increased efforts be made to ensure the general public were aware of the technical and educational nature of amateur radio compared with CB radio. Conference felt that in 2008 this recommendation was no longer relevant and it was deleted.

On the EMC front, the EMC working group reported that the IARU efforts to slow the adoption of a PLT emission standard had paid dividends. Romania asked that more information be provided to member societies about the work being done in the EMC WG. Chairman Christian Verholt, OZ8CY responded by commenting that some member societies such as the RSGB had regular high profile articles in their monthly magazine on EMC issues. More information was being issued and member societies were being asked to tackle their individual administrations head on with regards to PLT matters.

One area of concern was that the conference agreed to a recommendation by the C2 committee to set a deficit budget for the next three years. This was based on the level of the financial reserves, which were felt to be strong enough to allow the region to run the various lines of operations without cutbacks or increasing the subscription level. This was argued against strongly by the RSGB in both the C2 committee stage and the Final Plenary. The RSGB felt that the incoming Executive should be asked to review all budget headings and review costs with a view to presenting a break-even budget to member societies in year two and three. The action to encourage the Executive to seek ways to cut costs was supported by South Africa and Croatia and unanimously agreed by conference, however the arguments against setting a deficit budget were not supported by conference and the RSGB voted against the proposed budget in the Final Plenary.

C4 HF. *This report was prepared by John Gould, G3WKL, RSGB HF Manager.* The key HF focus was the expanded 40m band, which comes into play when the broadcasters move out of 7.1 – 7.2MHz from 29 March 2009. Inevitably, there were widely differing views but all agreed that CW, digimodes and SSB should get additional spectrum. The new 40m bandplan includes provision for digital voice and also recommends 'contest preferred segments' for both CW and SSB.

The other main agreement on HF was an updated chapter on 'Contest Guidelines' in the *HF Manager's Handbook* [1]. This, along with proposals from DARC and RSGB, means that Region 1 contest organisers retain control over setting frequency limits for their contests, but that they are expected to state what those limits are and also to manage the operation of their contest within those limits. For smaller contests, this should mean that more contests will fit within the contest preferred segments. Note that this will not constrain the larger contests, but it should mean that for many contest weekends there should be segments of the bands available for non-contest operation.

Other agreements were reached on restricting unattended beacon activity below 20m, adding some notes on SSB QRP and digitised voice to the HF bandplans. Below 169m, a bandplan for 136kHz was approved, and the 500kHz Working Group's remit was

extended to cover preparatory work for WRC11.

Operating Practice was another key topic for discussion. The majority feeling was that ON4UN and ON4WW's booklet *Ethics and Operating Procedures for the Radio Amateur* [2], which was endorsed by the IARU last summer, needed further publicity and, along with encouragement from Societies not to cause interference, it was thought that these measures should be sufficient to counter the operating problems experienced on the HF bands. Our approach on countering deliberate interference did not meet with approval as many Societies preferred to self-regulate rather than refer suspected jammers to their Administration. Given the lack of appetite for passing concerns about possible jammers to the regulators, with the inherent risk of taking action ourselves, the Society will likely draw a line under its work in this area. Time will tell though whether education is sufficient.

C5 VHF/UHF. *This report was prepared by David Butler, G4ASR, VHF Manager.* The primary VHF focus at the conference was one of band planning and future spectrum requirements within IARU Region 1. The meeting acknowledged that Digital Voice (DV) communication would, eventually, replace analogue FM voice traffic and that it was sensible to designate frequencies for dual-use rather than specify new channels specifically

for digital voice. It was also felt beneficial to designate calling frequencies and centres of activity during the initial transfer from analogue to digital, especially for those countries that have a low amateur radio population. Band planning discussions and recommendations were also made regarding Internet voice gateways, APRS allocations, EME, FAI propagation and meteor scatter usage.

RSGB introduced their paper on VHF spectrum requirements and the meeting agreed that it will be added into the IARU Region 1 VHF Managers Handbook. The key targets for spectrum requirements between 30 – 1000MHz include beacon allocations in the vicinity of 40 and 60MHz, the addition of a harmonised global allocation to the Amateur Satellite Service within the 50MHz band, a region-wide allocation at 70MHz and the establishment of 430 – 440MHz as a worldwide exclusive band.

Operating practice was another key topic for discussion with new QSO guidelines for Aircraft Scatter and Transitory Weak Signal procedures to be introduced into the VHF Managers Handbook. The requirement for a Region 1 AM allocation within the 2m band was raised and the meeting concluded that this mode could be carried out within the 'All Mode' segment. Other agreements were reached on the use of RSQ (Readability Strength Quality) for digital modes and MOS (Mean Opinion Score) for digital voice as a supplement for RST reporting. Discussions were also carried out regarding the requirement to increase VHF contest activity, the exchange of contest logs via a Region 1 website and definitions of remote controlled contest stations.

On the beacon front, the meeting agreed to encourage the deployment of multi-band VHF beacons such as GB3RAL that currently operates on 40.05, 50.05, 60.05 and 70.05MHz. The use of WSPR (Weak Signal Propagation Reporter) beacons in the 50, 70 and 144MHz bands was discussed and allocations agreed. The frequency suggested for the Six Metre band (50.400MHz) raises the possibility of a revised IARU Region 1 beacon band at a later date and a draft paper to this effect is being prepared by the RSGB.

C5 MICROWAVE. *This report was prepared by Murray Niman, G6JYB, Microwave Manager.* The three themes of Beacons, Digital modes and Spectrum also featured in microwave matters at the conference. First, beacons. Three RSGB papers were accepted that not only enhanced guidance, but addressed the growth in microwave beacons numbers and reception ranges by adding a new spectrally efficient 50kHz segment in most microwave bands – a noticeable feature in the new 2009 RSGB bandplans.

Two bands that came in for special attention were 1.2GHz (23cm) and 3.4GHz.

The 23cm band not only received a number of modernisation adjustments (Digital Voice, Echolink and Image modes), but widespread acceptance of the far ranging RSGB paper 'A New Vision for 23cm'. This agreed a reserve sub-band for narrowband operation at 1240 – 1240.75MHz and a new framework for flexible bandwidth Digital Voice, Data and DATV in what is usually considered to be a most challenging band, but potentially has the capacity to be a showcase for new amateur technology.

The 3.4GHz band has its own issues (not least its future use for 4G mobile communications). A pair of RSGB papers received unanimous support and go some way to address this. Bandplan and VHF Handbook changes will support the latest amateur developments in EME and Satellites as well as the efforts of other Societies to gain access to the all-important 3400 – 3410MHz segment.

Operating and contest matters were not overlooked. Adoption of a spreadsheet format for ATV contests was agreed. The new rules for remotely controlled contest stations provoked interest in the UK microwave 'rover rule', resulting in an invitation for a future proposal aimed at promoting activity.

Broader microwave spectrum matters, terrestrial and satellite, also received attention and conference approved papers specially suited to Region 1 needs and pressures, joining the VHF needs in the Handbook. This overhauled past interests in new / realigned frequencies, beacons (notably a new requirement near the 30GHz water minimum) and satellite bands. The papers adopted included a radical and more proactive strategy to counter the widespread commercial pressures on spectrum (notably in the 1 – 10GHz secondary allocations), marking a departure from past IARU practice.

SUMMARY. Overall the conference approved nearly forty top level VHF-Microwave recommendations resulting in a raft of detail changes, as well as IARU VHF Chairman OE1MCU forming a new team to support them going forward.

ELECTIONS. During the Final Plenary session, a number of key elections took place that directly affect the RSGB. RSGB President Colin Thomas, G3PSM, was voted onto the IARU Region 1 Executive Committee. Colin will hold the chair of the influential External Relations Committee. Bob Whelan, G3PJT, continues as the Chairman of the IARU Region 1 Regulatory and Licensing Working Group. Martin Harrison, G3USF continues as the IARU Region 1 Beacon Coordinator; Peter Kirby, G0TWW continues as Vice Chairman of the EUROCOM Group and, nominated and supported by the RSGB, Greg Mossop, G0DUB, was elected to the position of IARU Region 1 Emergency Communications Coordinator.

WELL DESERVED. The biggest and nicest surprise at the Final Plenary was the award of the Roy Stevens Trophy to Past RSGB

President and IARU Region 1 Secretary for the last six years, Don Beattie, G3BJ.

The Roy Stevens Trophy is awarded for an outstanding contribution in international amateur radio affairs in memory of the late Roy Stevens, G2BVN, who was RSGB President in 1966 and was a long-serving IARU Region 1 secretary.

The next Region 1 Conference will take place in Sun City, South Africa in October 2011.

Wireless Rescue

GB5CQD will be on the air on 23 and 24 January from the club rooms of the Scunthorpe Steel Amateur Radio Club. They plan to use the 2m band and the HF bands for their operation. The event is in commemoration for devotion to duty 100 years ago of Marconi Marine wireless operator Jack Binns on the White Star liner RMS Republic. The Republic had been in

collision with the SS Florida in thick fog and, as a result, was punctured below the waterline and began to sink.

Binns stayed at the key for 36 hours sending 200 messages with the distress cry CQD, which preceded the use of SOS. Over 1600 lives were saved.

The signal was received by the Marconi Station at Siasconset, Nantucket, which

alerted other ships to the rescue, making it the first sea rescue by wireless.

Binns worked as a wireless operator until 1912, when he turned down an assignment aboard the ill-fated White Star ship, the Titanic.

Other clubs planning to take part in the commemoration are the Radio Officers Association at the Lizard and Chelmsford Amateur Radio Society.

Rally with a Difference

Marconi Collection

In 2004, the Marconi Collection was presented to the University of Oxford by the Marconi Corporation. A three year project funded by the late Douglas Byrne, G3KPO under the auspices of the Wireless Preservation Society has enabled the sorting, arrangement and cataloguing of this vast archive, which is now one of the Bodleian's large collections. During the work, a number of fascinating items were uncovered including records of Marconi's earliest demonstration in Britain carried out on the roof of the General Post Office in London in July 1896. Of special interest are records relating to the Titanic disaster of 1912. These include the logs of ships' radio operators, who were Marconi employees, as well as thousands of messages exchanged before, during and after the emergency.

A further grant from the former Trustees of the Wireless Preservation Society, was announced in November. This will fund the 'Byrne Marconi Visiting Fellowship', which is intended to support study in the Marconi and related archives in Bodleian and the Marconi objects in the nearby Museum of the History of Science. Richard Ovenden, Keeper of Special Collections and Associate Director, Bodleian Library, said: "The collection will be of interest to researchers in the history of science, business and social history, and to technical enthusiasts who can draw on the outstanding depth and breadth of the archive. The Bodleian Library is delighted to have catalogued the Marconi Archive and to make it available online to the international community of scholars'.
